







## % of population sub-groups





# Total population by 5-year age groups & sex in 000'







*Land area coverage for selected crops, '000 hectares*




















#### III.3.1. DISTRIBUTION OF INWARD MISSIONS, 2007



#### *Arrivals by purpose of visit per month*





*Visitor Arrivals in Rwanda by Purpose of Visit in 2007*





*Holiday visitors by region of origin*








### III.3.3. VISITORS' MODE OF TRANSPORT

*Visitor Arrivals in Rwanda by Purpose of Visit and Mode of Transport*






